## Rend Lake College Upward Bound Program

The Rend Lake College Upward Bound Program is a federally funded college preparatory program designed to provide academic support, personal/career counseling, and cultural enrichment to participants who have the academic ability to be successful in college.

Upward Bound (UB) offers weekly tutoring sessions for 90 minutes at each target high school, monthly Saturday sessions on the RLC campus and a 6 week summer program, along with field trips to educational and cultural destinations. Our overall goal is to have all Upward Bound students enter and graduate from college. Mount Vernon UB tutoring sessions meet each Thursday immediately after school.

Any high school student who has completed eighth grade, but not yet entered eleventh grade and is enrolled at Mt. Vernon High School is eligible. Students qualify for UB enrollment by: demonstrating the academic potential and desire to complete a college degree, exhibit enthusiasm through toward learning, meet income guidelines established by the U.S. Department of Education, and are a potential first-generation college student (neither parent has a bachelor's degree).

To apply, pick up a pre-application from the Guidance Office (Ms. Lovin) and fill it out completely. Return the completed pre-application along with your most recent grades, and if you are a ninth grader, include your ISAT scores.

If you have any questions regarding the RLC Upward Bound Program, stop by the library after school on any Thursday, and speak with the Upward Bound Student Advisor.

Make sure that your student understands that a low grade or undesirable citizenship mark for the first nine weeks does not mean that he/she cannot do better the second and succeeding grading periods.

## NOTICE TO PARENTS/GUARDIANS

Parents or legal guardian(s) who must provide transportation to and from **school because free transportation is not available for their children** may be eligible to receive money from the state to help offset some of the cost for example, bus fares or mileage reimbursement for private automobiles at \$0.505 per mile.

If you can answer **yes** to the following questions for the 2008-09 school year, you may be eligible to receive reimbursement for providing such transportation.

- 1) Will the pupil be under the age of 21 at the close of the school year?
- 2) Is the pupil a full-time student in grades kindergarten through 12?
- 3) Does the pupil either live 1 1/2 miles or more from school or live less than 1 1/2 miles from school but **must be transported** due to a serious safety hazard approved by the Illinois Department of Transportation? (See following paragraphs.)
- 4) Does the pupil attend a school within Illinois which meets Illinois compulsory attendance laws?
- 5) Did the parent/guardian incur transportation expenses resulting from transporting the pupil to and from school?
- 6) Did the pupil not have access to transportation to and from school provided entirely at public expense?
- 7) Did the parent/guardian reside within Illinois during the time period expenses were incurred?

If you answered yes to the above questions, lived in Illinois and wish to file a claim, you must go to the school where each of your children is enrolled by June 30, 2009, to submit claim information. You may provide claim information to appropriate school personnel at your child's attendance center until June 30, 2009.

In addition, parent(s)/guardian(s) who have pupils living **less than 1 1/2 miles** from the school attended must verify that a safety hazard due to vehicular traffic exists by completing an Application for Determination of Serious Safety Hazards. Parents can obtain a copy of the Application for Determination of Serious Safety Hazards from the Office of the Regional Superintendent of Schools for the county in which they reside **except** parents residing within the City of Chicago. All applications for Determination of Serious Safety Hazards must be received no later than February 1, 2009, at the office from which the application was requested. The Regional Superintendent of Schools is required to send the Application to the Illinois Department of Transportation within 15 days. The Illinois Department of Transportation reviews and approves or denies the application and returns it to the Regional Superintendent of Schools within 30 days. Upon receipt of the reviewed application, the Regional Superintendent of the Schools will mail it to the parent/guardian who requested the safety hazard to be verified. **If the safety hazard is approved, the parent/guardian must go to the school the pupil attends to submit claim information.** Parents who received verification of a safety hazard during and after the 2005-2006 school year, whose children attend the same school and live at the same address do not have to reapply for safety hazard verification.

Once all claim information is submitted at the school, it will be transmitted electronically to the Illinois State Board of Education. If your claim information is approved, you should receive a check directly from the state for the lesser of the cost of transporting your child/children or the average per pupil reimbursed paid to public schools for transporting regular education pupils. If insufficient funds are appropriated by the General Assembly, all claims will be prorated.

### FFA to Attend Convention

The Mt. Vernon FFA Chapter will be attending the 81<sup>st</sup> National Convention in Indianapolis, Indiana, on October 22-25. This is the 3<sup>rd</sup> time the convention will be held in Indianapolis, Indiana. The chapter will have the opportunity to meet 55,000 other FFA members from all 50 states and Puerto Rico and The Virgin Islands.

The Mt. Vernon FFA will have the privilege to hear several motivational speakers, including Dana Hee, an Olympic Gold Medalist, and Tom Zupancic, who played for the Indianapolis Colts. They will receive two stars, Gold FFA chapter which is awarded to the 2% of agriculture programs and FFA chapters in the United States. Anthony Graham and Timothy Olinger were selected as students in the United States to receive the American FFA Degree. The Mt. Vernon FFA Alumni will be recognized as a Silver FFA Alumni Chapter. Our FFA Alumni will be recognized as one of the top 15 parent and community groups in the United States.

The chapter will also attend several tours, and places of attraction in Indianapolis, including the National FFA Center, the Speedway, a concert, and a rodeo.

Mt. Vernon High School is working hard to provide your children the best education possible to enter over 300 agriculture careers. More students are needed to pursue a college degree in agriculture to fill the demand for jobs in Illinois. We will have 38,000 students graduating from a 4 year agriculture university in 2008, and we will need 60,000 college students to fill those jobs.
